

# Ponderings from the Pastor's Pen

"Anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun!" -2 Corinthians 5:17

This verse from 2 Corinthians was one that I first memorized when I went through confirmation classes as a teenager. Confirmation was an opportunity to publicly proclaim our faith and claim for ourselves our identity as Christians. That first decision of claiming our faith in Christ was a new beginning for me and my fellow students in that confirmation class decades ago—a new beginning that would continue to transform and guide my life beautifully to this day.

As I write this message today, I have just dropped off my kids for their first day of a new school year, so new beginnings are on my mind. I think too of some of the wonderful neighbors I had a chance to speak with at our Corn Fest recently. Some of our neighbors were familiar names and faces I remembered from the conversations we had at our community outreach events last year. Some were neighbors I was just meeting for the first time. All of them were wonderful people with rich life stories. Some were very open in sharing the new beginnings they've worked hard to build in their lives recently. One was newly sober and determined to spend the rest of his life doing good in this world after the mistakes he regrets from his past. Another was eagerly antici-

pating her wedding this fall now that she has worked hard to heal from an abusive relationship in her past. Beautiful new beginnings abound!

As I reflected back on the conversations I had and the people I met, I love that our church has become a place of peace, a sanctuary, a refuge where all can feel just how loved and welcome they are—even when we're just sitting outside, dining together around tables in the parking lot. There are a lot of new beginnings that can happen in a community like this where people experience and freely share God's love for the world! I suspect we're just barely seeing the first glimpse of the new beginnings of what God is about to do here at the Menomonie United Methodist Church. May God continue to create us anew as we follow God, one conversation at a time!

I look forward to seeing you soon and I can't wait to hear about any new beginnings that may be bubbling up in your life these days!

# 2024 WI Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church Report By Kurt and Sarah Zarbock

Sarah and I attended The 2024 Wisconsin United Methodist Church Annual Conference, held in Green Bay, back in early June. It brought together clergy and lay members under the theme "Abundant God, Beloved Community." The conference focused on themes of spiritual renewal, community, and navigating the challenges and opportunities facing the church in a post-General Conference era. For a quick read, we've condensed the 12 hours of plenary sessions and the 14-page report on the Conference website (which you can read in its entirety at www.wisconsinumc.org).

Each morning we had an opening session including worship and Bible study, followed by plenary where we considered and voted on several action items and heard reports from various committees. The morning Bible study was led by Dr. Roger Nam from Candler School of Theology in Atlanta. The study was titled "An Abundant Promise to Abraham" based on Genesis 17:6-8. #### 1. General Conference Context:

•Bishop Jung underscored the significance of this being the first annual conference after the postponed General Conference of 2020, signaling a new chapter for the church in Wisconsin. He talked about the centrality of Jesus in our life, saying, "It's all about Jesus. it's not you; it's not me; its not us; it's all about Jesus...Are we listening?"

#### 2. Statistical Report and Financial Overview:

•Our Conference Statistician presented a report indicating a continuing decline in membership but a slight increase in average weekly worship attendance as well as an increase in Vacation Bible School participation.

•The proposed 2025 budget was discussed, highlighting challenges such as an anticipated change in church insurance coverage, decreased general-church giving, potential leadership changes, and the financial implications of sharing a bishop with Northern Illinois. Yes, you read that right...the WI Conference will share a bishop with Northern Illinois. This is not a merger. Rather, each Conference will keep its Conference office (so ours stays in Sun Prairie and Northern IL keeps theirs) and a new office will be set up for WI and Northern IL in Glenview IL. This decision is part of a broader trend within the United Methodist Church, reflecting decreasing membership (the WI Conference membership is about 25% of what it was in 1968 when we became United Methodists) and decreasing financial resources across conferences. Related to this...we passed an action item changing the number of districts in our conference from five to four. It was called Four Districts for a Revived! Church.

#### 3. New Ministries and Leadership Development:

• Currently, the Conference supports 23 new ministries, and has a system in place for beginning new min-

istries and developing new leaders. Also, as we are well aware of right here in our own Church, congregational renewal is occurring in the form of MCCI.

•The Revive! Community Development Planning Team presented a significant proposal to reallocate funds from closed churches to support new ministry initiatives. It will provide consulting for local churches such as ours looking to "right-size" our building, engage in church and community assessment, and offer our church leaders information on how to maintain and expand opportunities to be of service to our local community. This move is seen as essential for the church's future growth.

#### **Bishop's Address and Final Remarks:**

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung delivered a heartfelt state-of-the-church address, reflecting on his 12 years of service. I can still remember him appearing at our church as part of his initiative to visit all the churches in our Conference. He emphasized the importance of love, justice, and community in the church's mission. The conference concluded with expressions of gratitude and a renewed commitment to the future. Sadly, Bishop Jung leaves us as he is moving on to a new Annual Conference after September. He concluded his address with, "Wisconsin, you are the best state. You raised me; you raised my family. You are beautiful people. Thank you and thank you and thank you. Amen."

Retirements and Recognitions: A service was held to honor 18 retirees. This service was marked by a moving "Passing of the Mantle" ceremony where retiring clergy passed their stoles to new ordinands (numbering about 8), symbolizing the continuity of ministry. Just as Bishop Jung is retiring from the WI Conference of the United Methodist Church, we are retiring from our role as lay members after 10 Annual Conferences. It's been our privilege and a blessing to serve in this role. We would like to "pass the mantle" to two of you giving you an opportunity to serve in this role when the location changes back to Middleton at the Marriott Madison West next year.

The 2024 Annual Conference was a time of reflection, decision-making, and spiritual renewal. It addressed the pressing issues facing the church while celebrating the community and preparing for the future. The conference's decisions will shape the direction of the Wisconsin United Methodist Church in the years to come, as it seeks to grow and adapt in a changing world.

Finally, we'll leave you with this quote and a comment: "Life is risky. It's so risky, you don't get out of it alive." –Jim Rohn We are born from God's eternity, and we die to God's eternity. And in between, we are here in this risky life, which brings us more challenges than we would ever want to happen to us. And it has more beauty and blessing in it than we could ever imagine, in fact, than we are aware of. Thank you!



## The Church's Need to Receive or the Giver's Need to Give?

When I was first learning about stewardship early in my ministry, I heard someone say, "Good stewardship practices focus on the giver's need to give, rather than the church's need for money." At the time, I didn't buy it. To my cynical ears, it sounded like a line. Today (many years later), I can say that I was wrong.

We love our churches. We want them to thrive and succeed. They are near and dear to our hearts. So when the churches faces financial challenges, we want to plead with people how important it is to keep the ministries of our beloved church going. We need to pay the bills. Throw in the anxiety that surrounds any financial topic, we may want to push the point. The truth is the church's mission isn't to keep existing. In fact, we love our churches because of the ways God has touched our lives through them -ceremonies and rituals, helping us grow in faith and connection. Likewise, a church's teaching about faithful stewardship should be centered on helping people learn about the place of money in a Christian's walk of faith. It's about discipleship and partnering with God to make a positive difference in the world - whether people do that by being generous with the church or other organizations. (Note: I do believe people who are generous as a part of their faith include the church in their generosity if the church is faithfully living out its

Tithing benefits the giver as much as it strengthens the mission and ministry of the church - especially in the midst of our materialistic and consumerist society. We are immersed in a culture that feeds the appetite for more and bigger and that fosters that self-worth is found in material wealth and happiness comes by possession. As one person once said, "We buy things we don't even need with money we don't even have to impress people we don't even know!"

At the root, these are spiritual problems, leading to continued discontent, discouragement, and unhappiness. We can never earn enough to be happy. In fact, studies have shown that people believe all they need is more money to be happy, when in reality, an academic study concluded that money can only boost happiness up to a certain point (at about \$75,000 in annual income).

Practices like embracing gratitude do lead to more contentment. For instance, consider making a list of the things in your life for which you are grateful. It doesn't have to be long or take much time. Taking time to focus on what you have rather than concentrating on what you don't can be transformative. Beyond embracing gratitude, consider the following questions:

- How does living generously help you see the world through God's eyes?
- How is your own perspective shaped by materialism, acquisition, and the desire to possess? How is it shaped by the wisdom of God? How do you resolve tensions?
