

Because I will be gone for a couple of the weeks in Lent, instead of doing our usual Wednesday night soup suppers and Lenten worship services our main activity this Lent will be a study group on Thursday mornings at 10:15 on the book *Draw Close: A Creative Companion for Lent* by Stephanie Dunn. We already have other great leaders lined up for the weeks when I will be gone—both for the Thursday morning study group and of course for Sunday morning worship, so you won't want to miss out!

We will still have a couple of special worship services during Lent as well. March 5 is Ash Wednesday, so we'll have a soup supper at the church at 6:00 pm, followed by the Ash Wednesday worship service at 6:45 pm. Also, on Friday, April 18 at 7:30 pm (tentatively—watch future newsletter and bulletins for updated details) we'll gather for worship on Good Friday. Please mark your calendars and plan to join us for these special days in the season of Lent.

Parish Nurse News

As you know, one of my roles with our church is Parish Nurse. I was trained as a Parish nurse in 2001 at Luther Seminary in the Twin Cities. During January and February, I have been focused on loss and the grief process. I coled the *GriefShare* Program with Pastor Wendy again this year.

Grief is the natural process in response to a significant loss. Grief can be difficult because it affects all aspects of your life. During our grief class we covered many topics including loneliness, self care, anger, regrets, fear, grief and friendship, to name a few.

I have also been taking a 6 week class on crisis and trauma, as part of a Grief Care Certificate program. The final class, "Sharing the journey, Traveling from diagnosis and letting go, will complete the Certificate program.

We will be starting another grief group gathering, Tuesday, 4/22/25 to support all that are experiencing some kind of loss in their life. This class will be held quarterly during the year.

Some encouraging scriptures for reading include: Jeremiah 31:13 - "I will turn their mourning into joy, I will comfort them, and give them gladness for sorrow".

Psalm 34:18 - " The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit".

I am so glad to be supporting our church community and local community in this way!

Donations of Plastic Shopping Bags Needed

Most Midwesterners have a "bag of bags" tucked somewhere in their homes, collecting those plastic shopping bags from our groceries or other purchases. If your bag of bags is getting a little bulky, would you consider donating some excess bags to our circuit? Maybe you can even spread the word to friends or family members and ask them to share their extra bags too.

One of the mission projects we hope to take on this summer is weaving sleeping mats out of plastic shopping bags for people experiencing homelessness. During our next circuit-wide meeting on Sunday, April 6 at 1:30 pm we'll have a practice session where we'll learn the process for weaving those mats. Then throughout the next several months, the four looms we have in our circuit will travel from church to church so that each congregation can help complete as many mats as possible. It takes at least 500 bags to complete one sleeping mat, so we'll need LOTS of bags.

We also use bags for Monday's Meal, so if we somehow end up with even more than we need for the sleeping mats, we can put them to good use at Monday's Meal. Thanks in advance for any plastic shopping bags you can share!

I know we will still have some inclement weather on the horizon, but Spring is in sight. January and February have been extremely cold, and it was difficult for many of our members to attend services.

So, what has been happening in our church these past couple of months? Messy church continues to be held the second Sunday of the month from 10:30-12:00. There are fun activities, worship and a meal each time. Everyone is encouraged and welcome to attend no matter how young or "seasoned" you are.




Congratulations Fred Ochs! Barbershopper of the Year

UMC Dartball Team Plays On!

Few people realize that Menomonie United Methodist Church has a dartball team that plays three games every Monday evening from October 14 last year to March 10, with a tournament March 17 here.

The MUMC Team includes ten members, Steve Brantner, Craig Conklin, Blade Klatt, Kevin Klatt, Greg Kleindl, Gene Larson, Rod Lorenson, Anna McClung, Dave McNaughton, Bill Wiese, and Kurt Zarbock. Only nine play at a time.


It's a member of the Colfax Dartball League, which includes six churches — Big Elk Creek Lutheran Church, Iron Creek United Methodist Church, Menomonie UMC, Popple Creek Lutheran Church, Tainter UMC, and Trinity (Elk Mound) UMC. During the season, each team plays the others four times, two as the home team, two as the visitors.

The Colfax League is more than 50 years old. Rev. Craig Conklin, who served the Colfax and Tainter churches, says a player on the Tainter team remembers playing on the Colfax team as a teenager roughly 50 years ago and it was then well established. Colfax Methodist first mentioned a team in 1946 on the Dunn County News and the Colfax league was holding an organizing meeting in 1966, but it clearly was established before then. Craig says that at one time the league had 15 teams, including one at Colfax and two at Tainter. Now players from both churches play on one team.

Last year, Kevin Klatt learned about the Dartball league from Craig and, having played the game in the past, organized our team. Menomonie UMC joined last year.

Although not a member of the Wisconsin State Dartball Committee, established in 1951 to provide uniform rules for the game, the league follows its rules.

As the name indicates, dartball is a game based on baseball. Players standing in the Batter's Box 20 feet away throw darts underhanded at a four-foot square target with a baseball diamond painted on it and areas marked in separate colors with various possibilities—ball, strike, foul, out, etc. Single, double, triple and home run are marked with increasingly small white squares. In other details a game follows baseball, with home and visiting teams, three outs, nine innings, etc.



Dartball was invented in 1923 by dart-maker Apex Manufacturing in the Philadelphia area. Within a dozen years it had arrived here, with both Our Savior's and Beyer Settlement Lutheran churches mentioning it in their listings in the Dunn County News. By the early 40s most Lutheran churches in the area had teams and they seemed to be the only participants in regional and city tournaments. By the mid 40s other churches and groups started mentioning dartball. The 1960s to 1980s was the peak period for dartball

list in the News in 2013 included only five teams. The Colfax League is now the only one in this immediate area, although Eau Claire and Chippewa Falls have two, a commercial one and a church one.
